

Around 1,500 RNLI lifeguards patrol 249 beaches in the UK and the Channel Islands. These highly trained professionals assist thousands, particularly in the summer when watersports enthusiasts and young families flock to the coast.

The sight of a yellow and red-clad lifesaver watching the waves certainly brings beachgoers a sense of security. But what's easy to overlook is the incredible impact of lifeguard conversations. In summer 2017, RNLI lifeguards shared their local knowledge and lifesaving knowhow with over a million people, helping to keep the public safe from the water's perils.

Of course, lifeguards are always ready to rescue and give first aid to those in distress. So whether they're pulling people from the water, setting up safety flags, keeping at peak fitness with rigorous training drills, or visiting schools to pass on their experience to children, RNLI lifeguards play a vital part in the fight against drowning. Meet the Lifeguards

Your efforts will also help to fund lifeguard visits to local schools as part of the Meet the Lifeguards programme.

This growing scheme saw our professionally trained lifeguards reach over 150,000 children with water safety messages in 2017 – giving those most at risk of drowning the skills and knowhow to recognise danger, stay safe should they get into trouble, and even help to save lives themselves.

The cost of RNLI lifeguards

- training: £718 per lifeguard
- average annual running cost of a lifeguarded beach: £80,300*.

When a bodyboard washed up onto Croyde Beach, Senior Lifeguard Freddie Hedger knew something was wrong. He spotted its owner Mary Harkin out to sea, at the mercy of a powerful rip current. Freddie swam out to Mary who was, by now, unconscious and face down in the water.

He battled to protect her from the onslaught of waves, being dragged under himself at one point, while fellow Lifeguard Sean Deasy skilfully negotiated dumping surf to get them onboard the rescue watercraft. The exhausted lifesavers got Mary to shore. To everyone's relief, she was still breathing. Freddie and Sean began first aid and carried her to waiting paramedics.

Mary, now fully recovered, says: 'They put their lives on the line for me. If it wasn't for them, I wouldn't be here today.'

Freddie received the RNLI's Alison Saunders Lifeguarding Award in 2017 for his heroic deeds.
