

The Council in presenting the Annual Report for 1977 wish to thank all the collectors for their efforts in making the 1977 collection such a success.



Subscriptions to the fund, including monies paid direct to the RNLI and including the sale proceeds of the "Princess Royal" CS No. 7, ammounted to £58,706. This figure is somewhat lower than the revised total for 1976, but it was, perhaps, to be expected that the record level would not be maintained in a year of virtually complete pay restraints. However, a number of regular subscribers, including one or two of the larger Departments, were late in starting their annual collections and there is some hope that the carry-over in early 1978 may be larger than usual.

For the first time separate accounts are printed in this report for the usual Departmental collections and for monies sent to the RNLI. The arrangement is more simple than before and also enables the RNLI's use of their receipts to be shown in more detail.

In addition to the usual maintenance and allowances on service payments a total of £56,086 was paid to the RNLI towards the cost of the fund's latest lifeboat, the "Silver Jubilee" and £201 for radio telephone for the Torbay lifeboat station (CS lifeboat No. 37).

The payments from the fund for the "Silver Jubilee" Civil Service and Post Office No. 38 which will be stationed at Margate will be completed this year and the fund will have to consider its future policy for a new boat.

The RNLI have requested that the fund should consider the purchase of a new lifeboat to maintain our fleet and this project, which has been approved by the Council, appears in more detail in the Deputy Director's report which follows.

Mr. John Atterton, the Deputy Director of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution, in addressing the meeting, said that President, Chairman and the Committee of Management of the RNLI were very grateful to the fund for their generous continuous support for over 100 years—during which time 38 conventional boats have been purchased, together with an inshore lifeboat, and it should always be remembered that these boats had saved 3,700 lives since the foundation of the fund.

Mr. Atterton thought that members of the fund would like to know of the continuous review of the changing face of rescue work and that the business and policy of the RNLI was in the hands of committees consisting of people eminent in various fields, all of whom gave their services free. In this way, in conjunction with the Government, the boats, all of which were of the highest quality, were the most up to date in the world. In fact Mr. Atterton mentioned that the world's lifeboat services looked to the RNLI for a lead and the RNLI acts as the Permanent Secretariat to the International Lifeboat Conference which meets every 4 years.

Recently, on the international scale, the RNLI had organised the launching of a voluntary service for Spain, who now have a service known as the Red Cross of the Sea. The Spanish institution had contributed to the RNLI for its "know how" and advice. This, Mr. Atterton said, wa necessary, as the RNLI, being a Charity, could not use its funds for additional objects and could only help on a non-voluntary basis, but this was of course understood throughout the world.

The Search and Rescue Committee, in conjunction with the Coast Guards and other government agencies, constantly review the requirements of the service and plan ahead for the changing pattern of casualties. Over the last 20 years casualties have increased four-fold and to mention only two of the changed conditions, the RNLI, in addition to the ever-present need of the fishing fleets and other coastal vessels, have to consider the increased pleasure sailing and increased passenger traffic in the south and the entirely new risk presented by the oil rigs and their attendant flotillas of supply boats out in all weathers.

All the lifeboats are of the highest quality, designed by the RNLI, who have permanent draughtsmen and designers. They supply the parts and equipment, the boats being built by approved builders. The repairs and maintenance are entirely in the hands of the Institution's own workshops, although major work is done at recognised shipyards. The Institution's workshops never close and if a piece of equipment is required it can be supplied immediately to anywhere in the UK or Ireland, whether it is a Sunday, Christmas Day or an ordinary working day.

The Institution is committed to a fleet of self-righting boats by 1980. All new boats are of course self-righters and the older boats which have not yet spent their useful life are being converted to comply with this policy and government requirement.

New faster boats are being developed with the object of fast slip away self-righting lifeboats for the whole service.

The RNLI was very grateful for the latest boat, "Silver Jubilee", CS & PO No. 38, and he wished to take the opportunity of thanking Sir Ronald Radford for the cheque he had just received for the balance of the purchase price. He said he was heartened at the enthusiasm of the meeting and grateful to the fund for agreeing to finance a new "Arun" lifeboat similar to the "Edward Bridges" at Torbay, which would in three years' time when built, be allocated to Port-Rush in Northern Ireland, one of the fund's traditional stations where the "Lady Scott" was now stationed, and was now nearly at the end of her useful life.

Mr. Atterton said that the RNLI had no difficulty in finding crews for the boats, in fact in most places there were waiting lists. The inshore boats were manned by the young and a number of ladies are now crew members, who were most successful with the Atlantic 21.

Mr. Atterton said, while mentioning Atlantic 21's, what a success the inshore lifeboat at Southend-on-Sea had been and it had been on almost continuous service, having saved 35 lives in 67 launchings.

Unfortunately, from time to time, crew members lost their lives an he was sure members would wish to know that the RNLI paid pensions to dependents based on the Royal Navy scale of pensions for Chief P.O.

Mr. Atterton, in reviewing the organisation of the RNLI and the necessary, notwithstanding the very high proportion of voluntary-workers, of Administrative, Operational and Technical Staff Workshops, etc., pointed out the cost of the organisation was very high and with inflation the current running costs of the Institution amounted to £7,000,000 per annum.

The normal station had only one paid member — the motor mechanic — while all other crew members and the administrative staff were voluntary.

The RNLI were very grateful and while relying on all help, both financial and services, the Civil Service and Post Office Lifeboat Fund, being regular and reliable, was without doubt one of the mainstays of the Institution in their vital work in saving life at sea.
