The Report for 1973



The Council have pleasure in presenting the annual report for 1973 of the Civil Service and Post Office Life-Boat Fund.

For the fourth year in succession a record collection has been made. Receipts during the year amounted to £45,428, an increase of £9,233 over 1972. As is usual, this does not represent the final picture, since £16,656 of the receipts must be attributed to the 1972 appeal, raising the total response to that appeal to £41,594 (£1,700 more than 1971). The final figure for 1973 will not be known until later in 1974.

The special appeal sent out this year by your Council for the Life-boat to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Royal National Life-boat Institution produced a particularly marked response in the Post Office, which contributed £2,327 more than in the previous year. The response from other departments was various, but across the board the increased donations were very encouraging.

The late Miss E. Ashforth, formerly of the Inland Revenue, left a Fund legacy of £250, and the usual £15 was received from the estate of the late Miss E. A. Close. A number of special donations were received including donations in memory of deceased officers.


While the Council has a good story to tell in the matter of receipts, they would like to impress upon all members the growing demands on the Royal National Life-boat Institution's cash resources. Both the cost of new life-boats and that of conversions, repairs and maintenance rises at a fantastic rate in these inflationary times and it is vital that contributions should at least keep pace with the drop in values.

It has been the practice to deposit sums with the Royal National Lifeboat Institution against the purchase of new boats, and it has been arranged with the Royal National Life-boat Institution that they will credit us with interest half-yearly and that this interest may be used towards the maintenance of our boats.

During the year we have had twelve boats in commission. They have been launched 67 times and they have saved 55 lives.

Civil Service No. 36, the "Eric Seal," has been completed and is now on station at Eyemouth in Scotland. The naming ceremony by Lady Seal will take place at 14.30 on Saturday, August 3rd, and it is hoped that as many members as possible will be able to attend. A number of members were able to go out in the boat before she was accepted, and your Secretary had the pleasure of a coastal passage when she was on her way from Cowes to Eyemouth. During this passage it blew a force 9 gale and was extremely rough, but the "Eric Seal" behaved extremely well and proved llerself beyond doubt to be a first class craft. On arrival at Eyemouth a great deal of interest was shown including Border T.V. and the local press, and the T.V. film was very good and impressive. The "Eric Seal" was the life-boat that appeared on the "Blue Peter" television programme.

The Inspector of Life-boats No. 2 Division has written saying that the people of Eyemouth are thrilled with the Boat.

Because 1974 is the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the Royal National Life-boat Institution, your Council decided that a new Life-boat of the latest type should be purchased by the Fund and presented to the Institution to celebrate this event. Civil Service No. 37, which is to be an Arun Mark III, costing approximately £120,000 is being built at Littlehampto n; it should be launched in May 1974, and completed for the Lifeboat Exhibition at Plymouth from the 20th July to 31st August 1974. The Fund has already paid £47,438 towards the cost of the "Eric Seal" and £65,782 towards Civil Service No. 37. The Royal National Life-boat Institution estimate that a further £20,000 will be needed to complete payment for the "Eric Seal" and some £60,000 for Civil Service No. 37a total outstanding of about £80,000. Towards this amount the Royal Nation al Life-boat Institution already holds £40,700 deposited by the Fund. Thus about £40,000 is now needed to complete payment for both life-boats and at the present rate of contributions this should be possible at the end of 1974. Since in the same period a sum of £18,000 has been found for modifications to the "Pentland" (Civil Service No. 31), the Council consider that the whole is an achievement of which the Civil Service and Post Office might well be proud.

The Council wish to record the debt which they owe to all **thosa** departmental representatives who devote so much time and effort to t:.. appeals and collections and thus ensure the success of the fund.
