Trustees Report for 2009

This is the Trustees' annual report and financial statements of The Communications and Public Service Lifeboat Fund (the charity) for the year ended 31 December 2009. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005. In preparation of the financial statements the Trustees have considered the Charity Commissioners guidance on Public Benefit.

TRUSTEES

The Communications and Public Service Lifeboat Fund, whose short title is The Lifeboat Fund, consists of a Council and its governing document is its Constitution. The Council appoints the members of the Executive Committee who act as the charity's trustees. In inducting them, the Council requires new members to familiarise themselves with 'The Essential Trustee: What you need to know' a Charity Commission publication designed to provide trustees with a full awareness of their responsibilities and duties. OBJECTIVES

The object of the Fund is to raise money to further the work of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) by providing lifeboats or other items agreed with the RNLI. The Fund seeks to achieve this object by issuing an annual appeal to staff of the Civil Service, Royal Mail and BT and by promoting Payroll and Pension Payroll Giving.

ORGANISATION

The Council oversees the strategy, and the Executive Committee administers and manages the Fund. Day to day business of the charity is conducted by the Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer under the direction of the Executive Committee.

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2009

Naming Ceremony for Sgt Bob Martin



The Lifeboat Fund's 50th lifeboat, *Sgt Bob Martin*, was officially named during a ceremony at the Poole Lifeboat Station, Dorset on Saturday 6 June 2009. Diana Allpress, The Lifeboat Fund's Hon. Secretary, handed over the lifeboat on behalf of the Fund.

Sgt Bob Martin is an Atlantic 85 rigid inflatable lifeboat. The lifeboat was named in memory of Sgt. Bob Martin, a Chelsea Pensioner who raised £200,000 for the RNLI.

New Brighton Lifeboat in service



Charles Dibdin, The Lifeboat Fund's 51st lifeboat, went into service on 13 November 2009 at the New Brighton Lifeboat Station, Merseyside.

Charles Dibdin is an Atlantic 85 rigid inflatable lifeboat. The lifeboat was named after Charles Dibdin, who was one of the founders of The Lifeboat Fund in 1866 and later went on to become RNLI Secretary.

FUNDRAISING

Annual Appeal

Each year, the Fund launches an annual appeal for contributions. Supporters are encouraged to fundraise in many forms and representatives are encouraged to find new and exciting ways to boost their collections.

Retired Civil Servants, Royal Mail pensioners and BT staff mainly subscribe through pension payroll and payroll giving, respectively.

The Lifeboat Fund 2009 Competition was won by Carole Bell from the Department for Social Development in Northern Ireland. Carole's prize is a tour of the state of the art RNLI survival centre in Poole including two nights' dinner, bed and breakfast in the onsite hotel where every room has stunning views of the sea.

Marathons

Marathons are a great way to get fit and raise money for a good cause. If you would like to raise money for The Lifeboat Fund, please contact the Secretary, who will be happy to help with fundraising.

Card Aid

Card Aid can supply your organization with a corporate Christmas card printed with the address, logo and signatures and most importantly the charity name that you have chosen to support. If you choose The Lifeboat Fund one third of the price of the card is donated to the Fund.

Gift Aid



The Fund can reclaim tax on all donations if donors make a simple declaration that they have paid sufficient income tax and that they wish their donation to be made under the Gift Aid Scheme. Supporters are invited to complete the declaration form on the reverse of the appeal poster so that tax can be reclaimed. In 2009, the Fund reclaimed $\mathfrak{L}1,952$.

Payroll Giving and Pension Payroll Giving

The Fund actively encourages donations made in this way and has designed forms to be held in Government Departments to simplify support for the Fund. The charity processing agents (Charities Trust, Charities Aid Foundation and South West Charitable Giving) also provide forms that can be used and The Lifeboat Fund should be quoted if supporters wish to give to the Fund in this way.

The reason for the substantial increase in the number of launches and lives saved by The Lifeboat Fund's lifeboats is mainly because of the Fund's sponsorship of Public Servant, which is one of the lifeboats serving on the River Thames. These are the busiest lifeboats in the RNLI's fleet.

There are currently eight Lifeboat Fund lifeboats in the RNLI active fleet: Stranraer Saviour at Stranraer, Scotland: Mudeford Servant at Mudeford, Dorset; Angel of Holyhead at Holyhead, Wales; Hunstanton Flyer at Hunstanton, Norfolk; Public Servant at Lifeboat Pier, London; Sgt Bob Martin at Poole, Dorset; Charles Dibdin at New Brighton, Merseyside and RNLB Princess Royal at St Ives. The relief fleet includes RNLBs Guardian Angel, Windsor Runner and Fraser Flyer. During 2009, the Fund's lifeboats were launched 348 times, saving 15 lives and giving assistance to a further 332 people.

Three other lifeboats previously provided by the Fund are in a unique RNLI museum in Kent. The *Edward Bridges* (at Torbay until 1994), *St Cybi* (at Holyhead until 1980) and the *North Foreland* (at Margate until 1978) are all on display in the Lifeboat! Gallery at the Historic Dockyard, Chatham, Kent. This is well worth a visit.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

In 2009, the Fund collected £189,000 for the RNLI. The main sources of these donations were:

This table shows the continuing strength of support from pension payroll giving and the impact that legacies can have on funding.

The in-year cost to The Lifeboat Fund of collecting these donations was £5,200, or about 4 per cent, of which £2,580 relates to fees charged by the agencies that collect and distribute pension payroll giving on the Fund's behalf and £2,036 was the cost of printing appeal leaflets. This, however, does not take into account the original cost (£78,000) of the three appeals in 1997, 2001 and 2005 that triggered the pension payroll giving, nor the value, estimated at £17,000, of the Honorary Secretary's time and expenses that are sponsored by the Ministry of Defence.

Reserve Policy

The Fund does not hold any reserves. As necessary, it retains any sums required to meet planned expenditure, and transfers all other income as it arises to the RNLI, which holds The Lifeboat Fund's donations in a restricted fund, accruing notional interest, until there is sufficient to purchase a new lifeboat or such other purchase as the Fund decides on, under its sponsorship arrangements with the RNLI. The balance brought forward in this restricted fund at 1 January 2009 was £470,000, and by adding this year's net donations of £193,000 and £8,000 of notional interest less some minor expenditure, the restricted fund has a closing balance at 31 December 2009 of £669,000.

The Fund is wholly dependent on the services of unpaid volunteers and donations in kind. As such, it would wish to acknowledge the generosity of the Ministry of Defence in donating the services of its Honorary Secretary, of Reeves + Neylan LLP in donating their services as the Honorary Independent Examiner and of Finmeccanica UK in providing meeting facilities for the Executive Committee.

The Fund's financial statements and a summary of contributions are part of this annual report.

RISK MANAGEMENT

Apart from the relatively small amounts spent on fundraising and administration, the Fund passes all its receipts onto the RNLI for them to invest and hold in the restricted funds as explained above.

The main risks faced by the Fund are therefore a sudden drop in fundraising. However, as about 80 per cent of the Fund's income comes from pension payroll giving, trustees consider a sudden substantial reduction in this form of receipt to be low risk. And, as this income comes in on a monthly basis, it can be monitored regularly.

As a result of recent changes in the form and culture of the Civil Service, the Fund also faces the risk that its traditional method of circulating an appeal sheet to civil servants and Royal Mail employees is no longer as effective as it once was. As more appeals are now made through departmental intranets, the Fund has facilitated online giving to ensure that potential donors have a ready means of contributing.

The Fund's Chairman wrote to all Permanent Secretaries and Heads of Agencies asking them to support the Fund's Appeal. As a result, thirteen new departments took part in the 2009 Appeal.

REMUNERATION TO CHARITY TRUSTEES

No remuneration or other benefits were paid from the charity to a charity trustee.

FUTURE PLANS AND EVENTS

The Lifeboat Fund has discussed with the RNLI future opportunities for the deployment of the Fund's donations with the broad aim of funding lifeboats as evenly as possible throughout the UK. It has been agreed that, over the next year, The Lifeboat Fund would aim to fund the provision of a D-Class inshore lifeboat for Portrush Lifeboat Station.

The Fund also wishes to arrange that the funds raised in Northern Ireland, some £1,600 in 2007, are deployed for the benefit of Northern Ireland's lifeboat crews, probably through assisting their training. Final plans have still to be agreed with the RNLI as to how best to achieve this objective.

The Fund will continue to encourage support through Pension Payroll and Payroll Giving.

The Fund will also continue to encourage donors participating in the main appeal to make their donations under the Gift Aid Scheme so that tax can be reclaimed. Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs will not accept Gift Aid declarations without a home address and supporters are urged to give this information.

The Fund will remind supporters how a legacy can help lifeboat crews long into the future.

RELATIONSHIP WITH OTHER CHARITIES

Since its foundation in 1866, the Communications and Public Service Lifeboat Fund has been and still is the biggest single supporter of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. The RNLI is a registered charity that exists to save lives at sea by providing, on call, the 24-hour service necessary to cover search and rescue to 50 miles out from the coast of the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland. It depends entirely on voluntary contributions and legacies for its income, and mostly on volunteers* to man its lifeboats.

The RNLI pays for most substantial expenditure by the Fund out of restricted funds, held as explained above, subject to the approval of the Fund's Executive Committee. At the end of each financial year, the RNLI provides the Fund with a Statement of Account, which agrees the

amount held by the RNLI in a restricted fund on behalf of The Lifeboat Fund and which is reflected in the additional note set out below the Balance Sheet in The Lifeboat Fund's financial statements.

(* some Thames lifeboats have full time crew)

The Fund's Chairman, Sir Kevin Tebbit, is a member of the RNLI Council.

TRUSTEES RESPONSABILITIES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustee's report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993 and trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Independent examiner's report for the year ended 31 December 2009

Independent examiner's report on the accounts

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2009 which are set out on pages 11 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the 1993 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

Basis of independent examiner's statement

The RNLI also hold a fund of £6,022, which was donated to them by The Lifeboat Fund and is held as a restricted fund. This was a legacy given for the purpose of aiding a Lifeboat station in Scotland.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2009

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

1.2 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are funds that are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to advance the general objectives of the charity and that have not been designated for other purposes.

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when The Lifeboat Fund is entitled to the income and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Legacies are included when the Fund is advised by the personal representative of an estate that payment will be made or property transferred, and the amount involved can be quantified.

Where incoming resources have related expenditure, as with fundraising, the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Donations are only included in the Statement of Financial Activities when The Lifeboat Fund has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the Statement of Financial Activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Donated services and facilities are only included in incoming resources, with an equivalent amount in resources expended, where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Investment income is included in the accounts when receivable.

1.4 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities, they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

1.5 Value Added Tax

Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the charity and, as such, is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

These are capitalized if they can be used for more than one year, and cost more than £500. They are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Office Equipment - 25% straight line over 4 years

<u>Item 1 – Chairman's Opening Address</u>

1. The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting. Apologies were received from Mr Peter Housden, Sir John Bourn, Mrs Margaret Smith, Mr David Kellett, Mr Harold Blythe, Mrs Brenda Weston, Ms Mamie Clugston, Dame Valerie Strachan, Ms Cheryl Openshaw, Mr Tony Barker. Mr Ivor Keates. Miss Ivv Dravton. Ms Alison Hoffman and Ms Linda Pender.

<u>Item 2 – Treasurer's Report</u>

- 2. The Hon. Treasurer reported that the Fund raised £189,019 in 2009, which compared with £132,500 in 2008. Pension payroll giving was down by £5,500 which represents the natural steady diminishing of receipts in this category of about £5k per annum. Payroll giving (the majority of which is from BT) increased by £4,000 following a decline in 2008. The last time this was above £18,000 was in 2003. Receipts from the traditional appeal to serving civil servants were down by £12,500 from £42,000 in 2008 to £30,000 in 2009. This was partly attributed to the later appeal day which meant some amounts raised were received after 31 December 2009 but a more major factor was likely to have been the economic downturn. The Fund received three legacies totalling £75,000, which accounted for the whole of the increase in income.
- 3. In 2009 the Fund received notional interest from the RNLI of over £8,500. This was substantially lower than in the previous year due to the fall in interest rates. Fundraising costs were £22,800, of which some £16,500 was sponsored by the MOD and some £2,600 of which related to the charges made by the agencies that collect and distribute pension payroll giving. This meant that the direct cost to the Fund of raising some £190,000 was about £2,600 or 1.4 per cent. During the year, the Fund gave £196,000 to the RNLI.

- 4. At the end of 2009, The Fund had a balance of about £669,000 towards its programme of expenditure agreed with the RNLI, which is estimated to cost about £300,000 (for Poole, Portrush and New Brighton lifeboats). The Hon. Treasurer expected the Fund to be able to fulfil its agreed programme with the RNLI to the end of 2010.
- 5. The Chairman thanked the Hon. Treasurer and Reeves + Neylan LLP for their work in preparing the financial accounts. The Council approved the 2009 Trustees Report.

<u>Item 3 – Secretary's Report</u>

- 6. The Hon. Secretary gave details to the meeting of the Fund's lifeboats. In 2009, the boats had been launched 348 times, 15 lives had been saved and a further 332 people had been rescued.
- 7. The Lifeboat Fund's 50th lifeboat, *Sgt Bob Martin*, was officially named during a ceremony at the Poole Lifeboat Station, Dorset on Saturday 6 June 2009. Diana Allpress, The Lifeboat Fund's Hon. Secretary, handed over the lifeboat on behalf of the Fund.
- 8. The Lifeboat Fund's 51st lifeboat, *Charles Dibdin*, went into service on 13 November 2009 at the New Brighton Lifeboat Station, Merseyside. The lifeboat was named after one of the founders of The Lifeboat Fund in 1866 who later went on to become RNLI Secretary.
- 9. The Fund's next vessel would be a D-class inshore lifeboat for Portrush Lifeboat Station.
- 10. Last year the Chairman wrote to Permanent Secretaries and Heads of Agencies asking them to support the Fund's appeal. As a result, 13 new departments took part in the 2009 appeal.
- 11. The winner of the 2009 appeal competition was Carole Bell from the Department for Social Development, Northern Ireland. Carole's prize was a tour of the state of the art RNLI survival centre in Poole including two nights' fully inclusive stay at the onsite hotel. The competition would be run again in 2010, linked to the annual appeal. There was a decrease last year in the number of people entering the competition. In an effort to broaden the appeal of the competition, £100 would be spent this year on additional prizes.
- 12. The Hon. Secretary announced that The Lifeboat Fund Appeal Day would take place on Friday 17 September 10. If this date was inconvenient or departments would prefer to hold an ongoing appeal, they would be given the option to choose a more appropriate date. A workshop for department representatives was planned in May/June 10 to share fundraising ideas.
- 13. Last year the Hon. Secretary produced several articles for the CSPA Pensioner magazine advertising the Portrush Lifeboat Appeal last year which brought in £672. She planned to advertise this appeal in the CSPA magazine throughout 2010.
- 14. Gift Aid was still a good source of revenue and the Fund reclaimed £1,952 of tax in 2009. The Hon. Secretary encouraged supporters to fill in the declaration on the appeal sheets or download the form from the website.
- 15. Sponsored participation in events such as Marathons was a great way to get fit as well as raising money for the cause. Anyone who would like to raise money for The Lifeboat Fund in this or any other way was invited to contact the Hon. Secretary, who would be happy to advise and assist.

16. Payroll Giving and Pension Payroll Giving remained valuable sources of income for the Fund and the Hon. Secretary asked department representatives to encourage these methods of support where possible.

<u>Item 4 – Election or Re-election of Officers</u>

- 17. The Chairman announced that he had decided to step down from his post. He joined the Executive Committee in 2002 and had served as Chairman since 2004. Whilst he had enjoyed his time as Chairman, he felt it was best for the role to be held by a serving senior member of the Civil Service and was therefore glad to be able to announce that Peter Housden was prepared to be nominated to take over as his successor.

- 22. The Chairman thanked those present and all the many people who have worked so hard to raise money for the Fund. He extended thanks to everyone, both serving and retired, for their generous contributions which enable the Fund to continue to support the work of the RNLI. He commended the initiative launched by his successor to galvanise fundraising efforts in the major departments and to increase support for departmental representatives on a more continuing basis. Finally, the Chairman wished everyone good luck for the 2010 Appeal.
- 23. The Deputy Chairman thanked the Chairman for his service to the Fund. He noted that the Chairman had moved the Fund forward under his tenure to face a brighter future and that many people owe their lives to the charity and the Chairman's leadership.

<u>Item 7: Guest Speaker – David Brook, RNLI Engineering and Supply Director</u>

24. The Council was briefed by David Brook on engineering excellence within the RNLI and the next generation of RNLI Lifeboats. The Chairman thanked him for a fascinating and informative insight into the more technical aspects of operations which the meeting found most valuable.

Item 8: Any Other Business

- 25. The Chairman conveyed the Fund's best wishes to Stuart Willson as he moved to his new position as Director of Regional Fundraising with Guide Dogs for the Blind. He thanked Stuart for the support and insight which he had brought to the Executive Committee meetings over the years.
- 26. It was agreed, at Nick Cheetham's suggestion, that the Fund's website would be revamped and updated before the next Executive Committee meeting.
